

Dear friends,

Writing messages such as these for the newsletter several weeks ahead of their publication and trying also to be relevant, is a risky business. Things can change very suddenly between writing and publication.

I'm writing this in mid-November, against the background of the tragic conflict which erupted on 7th October in Israel-Palestine, but which has its roots in more longstanding, complex historical realities. By the time you read what I have written, the situation in Israel-Palestine could have changed significantly. Whilst I hope and pray, as I'm sure you do, for positive change which leads to peace, my fear is that the change could actually be further entrenchment, and resulting escalation of the suffering.

All of this is taking place in what is often referred to as 'The Holy Land'. (On the page opposite you'll find an advert for 'A Pilgrimage to the Holy Land', which I am due to co-lead in May/June 2024. At this stage, I have no idea whether or not this will happen. And I admit to having mixed feelings, for various reasons, about whether it should go ahead).

The Holy Land is also sometimes referred to as 'The Land of Jesus' Birth'. At this time of year we share in Christmas, our annual celebration of Jesus' birth. I'm sure that I won't be alone in having a heavy heart as preparations are made for the celebration of the birth of the Prince of Peace this year. If my heart is heavy, I can barely imagine the fear which will overshadow and consume so many people in Israel-Palestine this Christmas.

In the face of inhuman violence and conflict, we may feel powerless. However, as I was preparing this letter, I was reminded by one of our church members (in relation to a completely different situation) that 'our prayers are effective'. So, I encourage you to pray.

Some years ago I was given a *Christian Aid* bookmark. I still have it, and on it is printed the following words,. They moved me when I first read them, and they do so even more now:

Pray not for Arab or Jew, for Palestinian or Israeli, but pray rather for ourselves, that we might not divide them in our prayers but keep them both together in our hearts.


That prayer reminded me of a poem by Howard Thurman, which I first came across in an anthology of prayers compiled by Christian Aid:

When the song of the angels is stilled; When the star in the sky is gone; When the kings and princes are home; When the shepherds are back with their flocks - the work of Christmas begins:
to find the lost; to heal the broken;
to feed the hungry; to release the prisoner;
to rebuild the nations; to bring peace among the people;
to make music in the heart.

The song of the angels was, and remains, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests' (Luke 2:14).

This Christmas, especially, let us pray in the name of Jesus, the Prince of Peace, for ourselves and for the peace of God's world.

I want the thank the whole Circuit for the retirement gift of this beautiful Advent ring, with candles. It was made by a craftsman based at the "Chapel in the Fields" Methodist project in Derbyshire, and Andrew brought it over when finished. Round the outside are carved the first words of the seven "O antiphons" of Advent, from the worship life of the early Church. They are traditionally used for the last seven days of Advent, up to Christmas Eve.

Continua O Emilianus

Translated into English, each antiphon (a prayer) begins with the expression of longing, "O", and then a title of the Messiah from the Old Testament:

O Wisdom, O Adonai (Hebrew for "Lord"), O Root of Jesse, O Key of David, O Dawn of the East, O King of the Nations, O Emmanuel (Hebrew for "God with us").

I imagine you have probably recognised five of them from the old Advent hymn we sing, "O come, O come Immanuel" (Singing the Faith 180), which gives us the rest of the prayer that goes with each of them.

So, thank you ALL OF YOU! I will be thinking of you as we use it through Advent this year. William

The Thanksgiving Service for Leo Osborn

It was my privilege to attend the thanksgiving service for Revd. Canon Leo Osborn in Newcastle Cathedral on Friday 10th November. Leo, when Chair of Newcastle District, was appointed the first Ecumenical Canon of the Cathedral, so the service was hosted and framed by the Cathedral clergy. Music before the service was given by the Cathedral choir, setting an atmosphere both joyful and contemplative before the introductory organ voluntary. Our senior Methodist leaders offered tributes, the sermon and prayers; the Bishop gave the final blessing.

Many of you reading this may have watched the service online, so this note is of personal recollections.

I was there at Charlotte's specific invitation since she included in the service a hymn which I wrote for what should have been Leo's last service with us at Oakham, on Easter Sunday 2020. It was, indeed, Leo whose challenge stimulated my hymn writing when he brought Oakham's Local Preachers and supernumeraries together to create our first shared series of services for Advent. But that farewell Easter service was never held because lockdown intervened. So for me it was deeply moving to hear the hymn sung, for the first time, with a full cathedral choir, organist and congregation; and Oakham Methodist Church and our Circuit were represented at the heart of the service.

I also encountered Andy Fyall and Sarah Lamb, who send their greetings.

The opening hymn, Charles Wesley's 'O thou who camest from above', set the context for any Methodist preacher in the congregation: for almost all of us, it will have been a part of our recognition service as Local Preachers. It reminded me of the funeral service, at Hinde Street in London, for Donald Soper, who asked to be remembered simply as "one of Mr Wesley's preachers". The tributes, including Charlotte's own, and the sermon from Leo's friend Martyn Atkins, recognised Leo's character as a preacher, a theological thinker, and supremely as a pastor: these were qualities Mr Wesley would have instantly recognised and which those of us under his care experienced at first hand.

As a whole, the service both recalled Leo as we knew him here, and also opened windows on unsung qualities we may have been unaware of. As everyone's tributes ended: may he rest in peace, and rise in glory.

A tribute to Leo Osborn from his book - Light From Light

For me, and for many others – Advent, Epiphany and Candlemas are very significant days in our Christmas journey- but often overlooked. I learnt this time of preparation and meditation whilst attending bible studies and silent meditations, living in North Germany on the Luneburger Heide. Plenty of time to be still as the weather in those days was often very cold, wintry and deep snow.... But beautiful.

Epiphany - 6th January,

This time emphasises the principal feasts of the Church – the Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. It also emphasises that from the moment of the Incarnation, the Good News of Jesus Christ is for all – Jew and Gentile, the wise and the simple, male and female – perhaps even more significant this year as the war-torn lands are suffering even greater challenges – and we are asked to pray – pray – pray for peace.


Leo had the privilege of a short stop-over in Cologne/Germany during his sabbatical, and visited The Cathedral there (and Christmas Market!) The Cathedral is magnificent, one of the largest in Europe, but only upon reading/visiting the Cathedral did I learn that in the Middle Ages Cologne was a major place of pilgrimage for in 1164 the supposed bones of the "Three Magi" were transferred from Milan to Cologne and placed in a shrine which is still visited by thousands today.

There is no indication in Matthew's Gospel that The Magi who came to see the infant Jesus in Bethlehem stayed over long – yet their long journey and their short stay were life-changing. It brought them to their knees in worship and in presenting their gifts. Presents and this special day are still celebrated throughout the Mediterranean and surrounding countries – for me it was the opportunity/joy of sharing with others in a day of celebration by the Ethiopian Church with whom we were twinned.

It is also a time to give thanks for the Epiphany message and for all those who are pilgrims, fellow travellers, sight-seers, curious or simply passers-by, who are welcomed and invited to come and worship and to offer our gifts.

So – where is your faith-journey taking you this year? What gifts are you bringing to the Christ-child?

Be Gentle On Yourself

Kaleidoscope met on 11th November at Ashbrook for a time of reflection, peace and fellowship. There were eleven of us as we gathered together for coffee and mince pies etc before beginning the session "Be Gentle On Yourself". It was a cold, autumn morning with bright sunshine, so with the heating turned up we settled down as Linda lead us into the morning's activities and talked about her father's injury during the war which left him hospitalised for a year. This was relevant to it being Remembrance Day and we heard of other people's family experiences of the war.

Linda lead us in reading Psalm 139 with responses which was an adaptation by Alan T. Dale. The contemporary translation made us think of that well-known Psalm in a new way, giving us new insights, the final words saying ..."I cannot fathom your thoughts any more than I can count sand on the shore! Yet after all my searching I am still in your presence".

It was a morning of relaxation as we certainly were "gentle on ourselves" with Angie and Beryl giving hand massage to those who fancied a bit of pampering, using beautifully scented lotions provided by Jean. There were pretty flower designs to colour in, many books to delve into and writing materials for those wishing to use them. There were Poppy Blessings to choose and take home which were different blessings written on white tags in the shape of Peace Poppies. I have hung mine in the kitchen so I can see the words every day and be reminded of God's blessing of peace to me and His nearness.

At 11am we reassembled together to observe two minutes silence to remember those killed in war and conflict. It was very moving as we all stood together, each with our different thoughts. Linda then read a prayer for peace as we remembered the wars going on at present in Gaza, Israel, Ukraine and other places in the world.

Beryl then lead a meditation called "You Are Worth Celebrating" and in faith we imagined God before us and within us, telling us how unique we are, what great potential we have if we believe in ourselves...how we are accepted despite our mistakes...to let things go that trouble us and remember we belong to the "now". This was followed by a repeat of the meditation, but making it personal and addressing God as a prayer "Loving God I am worth celebrating, I am worth everything to you...." I felt it was a beautiful meditation that went deeply into how God values each one of us and how special we are to Him, just as we are.

Handouts were given called "I Will Not Die An Unlived Life" which were to be taken home and pondered on. These were filled with positive and life affirming statements, along with helpful tips we can use in our daily lives that help us along the way..."You're your own person – the authentic/natural you"..."Trust in God's extravagant love for you – God is not stingy!"

Finally we then listened to the track "Deep Peace".. a Gaelic Blessing by John Rutter sung by Katherine Jenkins and held hands as we stood in a circle to say the Grace to each other.

It was a special time of peace and quiet mixed with coffee and nibbles, chat, insights and meditation as we looked out at the stunning autumn colours of the trees in the garden. Thank you Lord, You are SO wonderful in giving us all of these blessings in just one morning!



Candlemas - 2nd February

This day marks the completion of forty days since the birth of Jesus when Mary & Joseph took the child to the Temple in Jerusalem. The requirements of the Levitical law were for Mary to be "cleansed", the completion of her purification following the birth of a male child.

Simeon and Anna were faithful servants of God. On seeing the holy family, Simeon praised God acclaiming the infant as "the light to enlighten the nations", and the prophet Anna gave thanks and proclaimed Him her Redeemer.

The image of Christ as the Light has led to the celebration of light overcoming darkness, with candles often taking central place in the worship on this special day. It also, for many, is the time to take down their decorations from the festive season – cobwebs as well!

The candles that have been burning brightly these past two months are extinguished. They were lit as the days were growing shorter and darker, they will be extinguished as the days are growing longer and brighter. 
